'Tis the season not only for turkey, stuffing and Santa Claus – but also for hair! The East Valley Institute of Technology's largest program – Cosmetology – recently hosted hair shows on the Main and East campuses to showcase students' styling skills and creativity.

The EVIT East Fantasy Hair and Fashion Show drew a crowd of about 400 people. The campus was set up like an art gallery with twinkling lights and hair models and their creators staged throughout. The event raised about \$585 for Mesa United Way.

The Main Campus Fantasy Masquerade Hair Show included daytime shows by first-year students that raised \$500 for the United Way. The students' hair designs were modeled after characters in children's books and movies, such as "How the Grinch Stole Christmas" and "Hairspray."



Participants in the evening Fantasy Masquerade Hair Show were Aesthetics and second-year Cosmetology students who chose their own theme and created the look from head to toe. The show attracted 380 guests and raised money for the student fund and for entrance fees in Skills USA competitions coming up in February and April.





Cosmetology thanks everyone for their support and help in putting the shows together, especially the Radio, Video, Multimedia, and Fashion, Interiors and Design programs, as well as maintenance and administration. But most of all, said instructor Janice Kongas, thanks should go to the students. "Without the students," she said, "none of this would be possible."

Program provides multiple paths to early childhood careers



After she graduates from Scottsdale's Desert Mountain High School, Claudia LaGarde plans to go to college and become a special education teacher. But already at age 16, she's getting classroom experience through the Early Childhood Education program at Mesa's East Valley Institute of Technology.

"I'm learning to be really patient," LaGarde said of her work with children in a Head Start program that partners with EVIT. "They're willing to love you if you love them."

When she completes the program in spring 2015, LaGarde will have received over 120 hours of instruction and worked 100 to 300 hours in a classroom setting. She and her classmates also have the opportunity to earn 16 hours of college credit while in high school through dual enrollment with Mesa Community College. And, starting in the 2014-15 school year, a Child and Family Studies Certificate from MCC will be offered.

"The students coming out of the EVIT early childhood program are unique because they've already accomplished so much by the time they get out of high school," said instructor Lisa Bradford.

Her program is an example of how EVIT has evolved into a school that prepares students for college, as well as careers after high school.

Tuition-based programs for adults are also available – an area that EVIT is trying to grow in its early childhood program. Bradford said the program especially has openings for adults in the morning session. Once they complete the program, they are fully trained and ready to work as professionals in early childhood education.

Students in the two-year program focus in their first year on early childhood development, careers, health, nutrition and special education. They also gain practical classroom experience working with infants, toddlers and young children at partner Bridges Preschool, which serves as a lab training school on the EVIT Main Campus. And, they can get additional experience at the Head Start program located nearby at Webster Elementary School. In their second year, they select an internship and research professional opportunities. Qualified students can earn their Child Development Associate Credential, a national certification.

Students completing the early childhood program have the opportunity to interview for jobs with the program's three partners – Bridges Preschool, Head Start, and Bright Horizons, a corporate-sponsored child care service.

EVIT students also have the option of enrolling in a college-prep Education Professions program, where they learn more about the teaching profession and theories of learning. (Continued on Page 5)

"It's an individualized program," Bradford said. "We are a gateway to college with multiple exit points."

In fact, 100 percent of the students who completed her program last spring have been placed in jobs, college or the military – with most being enrolled at Grand Canyon University, Arizona State University, and other colleges.

Bradford said the program is not only a gateway to teaching, but also to other professions that work with young children, such as pediatrics or counseling.



Deidre Hightower, a mentor teacher with Maricopa County Head Start, said she is not aware of any other high school program that prepares students as in-depth as EVIT does in early childhood education.

"They've had the opportunity to interact with children in a classroom on a daily basis," Hightower said. "They learn all aspects of getting kids ready for kindergarten."
