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EVIT radio station becomes The Pulse

The radio station at the East Valley Institute of Technology has a new name to better reflect its hyper Dance Top 40 teen-focused format: The Pulse.

"If you're listening to us and you're low on energy, we'll pep you up," said radio instructor Steve Grosz. "We're commercial-free energy."

Formerly known as The Goldmine, The Pulse at 90.7 FM and 92.7 FM has EVIT students more involved as on-air personalities and producers. And, starting Jan. 1, GoldmineRadio.com will be replaced with Teen-PulseRadio.com, an Internet-streamed radio station featuring music (EDM, Dubstep, Techno, Top 40, Remixes and more), videos, and gossip/ news by teens for teens.



"No other radio station really focuses on teens. They don't feel they can make enough money off of them," Grosz said. "At EVIT, teens are our number one target."

But that doesn't mean there isn't something for older listeners too. The Pulse plays a diverse mix of music on Sundays, from jazz to reggae. And every week on "Wayback Wednesday" you may hear anything from Ballroom Blitz to Hurts so Good to Amazing Grace (bagpipes and all).

The Pulse and TeenPulseRadio.com form the heart of EVIT's Radio/Audio Production program, where students gain experience in day-to-day operations of the music business, including audio production, radio advertising, promotions, image branding, and news writing. The students also work in digital audio workstations that are standard in recording studios and may have the opportunity to broadcast a show and participate in live radio remotes.

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Let EVIT Culinary do your Thanksgiving baking

Student bakers at the East Valley Institute of Technology will use 2,000 pounds of flour in November as they make pumpkin pies, rolls, brownies and other goodies the public can buy for Thanksgiving dinner.

Any profits from the annual Thanksgiving Baked Goods sale help provide scholarships to students in the Culinary Arts and Commercial Baking programs at EVIT, a Mesa career and technical education school for high school students and adults.

But usually, the amount brought in just covers the cost. The real benefit to the students is in the planning, preparation and baking itself.



"We do this solely to give our students the experience," said culinary instructor Tricia Guerrero. "Making two pies at a time is not real world work experience."

So EVIT students take about 750 orders from the community and then spend Thanksgiving week measuring, kneading, rolling and baking a massive amount of bread and pastry: 1200 pies, 1500 loaf breads, 150,000 rolls.

"The entire building for a week smells like pumpkin pie spice," Guerrero said. "The whole building smells happy and good."

The menu includes white and wheat dinner rolls (\$1.25 per dozen); apple, apple cranberry, and pumpkin pies (\$6 each); dark chocolate iced brownie bars and pumpkin pie walnut bars (\$5); pumpkin, cranberry orange, banana walnut, spiced apple and dark chocolate loaf breads (\$4 per loaf).

The last day to order is 3 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 20. Orders will be ready for pick-up from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 26 and Wednesday, Nov. 27.

"Steve (Grosz) does so much for us," Phillips said, "we have to give back."
