2013-14 draws over 4,000 to EVIT campuses







The East Valley Institute of Technology started the school year on Aug. 7 with more than 4,000 students and a new Apache Junction campus.

Health occupations classes continue to enroll the most students. As of Sept. 3, health programs had 989 students.

Enrollment is also booming this year at the East Campus, 6625 S. Power Road, where second-year medical assistant, veterinary assistant, second-year cosmetology, and law enforcement programs have been added to course offerings that already included aviation, human anatomy and physiology, nursing assistant, and first-year medical assistant and cosmetology programs.

"We've gone from 200 students to 650 students and now to 750 students. And we're out here in the sagebrush where horses sometimes ride up to campus. It's very unique," said East Campus principal Molly Miller.

EVIT has also taken over operation of Apache Junction district's CTE programs.

EVIT adds 3rd campus at Apache Junction High

The East Valley Institute of Technology has added a third campus through a new partnership with the Apache Junction Unified School District.

EVIT is offering welding, construction, culinary arts, early childhood education, and photography programs at Apache Junction High School, 2525 S. Ironwood Drive. The campus will also offer some business, fire science and sports medicine classes. The programs will be taught by EVIT teachers and overseen by EVIT administration.

"This is an exciting partnership for Apache Junction High School as it places EVIT in the driver's seat of our CTE (career and technical education) program allowing it to grow into the standard they have built throughout Arizona and beyond," said Apache Junction Superintendent Chad Wilson. "We feel a CTE program under EVIT's guidance will attract new students to our campus while at the same time reducing costs for our district."

EVIT provides career and technical education programs tuition-free to high school students and tuition-based to adults. The Apache Junction partnership gives EVIT three campuses, also including the Dr. A. Keith Crandell (Main) Campus at 1601 W. Main St., Mesa, and the East Campus, 6625 S. Power Road, Mesa.

"We are pleased to take on that responsibility in the hope that we will be able to affect the Apache Junction CTE programs in a positive way," said EVIT Superintendent Sally Downey.

About 485 students are currently enrolled in EVIT programs at Apache Junction.

EVIT purchases old Fazoli's restaurant for school project



The East Valley Institute of Technology has purchased the former Fazoli's restaurant property in west Mesa to convert into a restaurant that will be refurbished and eventually operated by EVIT students.

The governing board approved the \$245,000 purchase of the property, located just east of the Dr. A. Keith Crandell Main Campus, 1601 W. Main St., during its Monday night meeting.

Fazoli's closed the restaurant several years ago, and since then it has remained vacant. EVIT Superintendent Sally Downey said homeless people had been staying inside and there has been extensive damage

from thieves vandalizing the property.

Downey plans to make the property a school project with Welding, Construction and HVAC (heating, ventilation, air conditioning) students repairing and refurbishing the building. Then Interior Design students will renovate and decorate.

The re-build is expected to be finished within a year. After that, Downey envisions EVIT's Culinary department, perhaps in partnership with the school's health programs, doing specialty cooking there.

EVIT students win gold in national competitions



Summer was golden for several EVIT students who came out on top in national CTE competitions.

3D Animation students Damian Richard and Lance Wells won the gold medal at Skills USA, and the 3D Animation team placed in the top 10. Aesthetics student Tyra Nelson also placed in the top 10 at Skills USA.

At HOSA nationals, the EVIT HOSA group won first place for raising the most money -- \$9,800 – for cystic fibrosis, Cassiana Wright placed third in dental science, and teacher Sharon Black was named outstanding advisor for Arizona.

And, at FCCLA nationals, Aubrey Mollett and Hailey Funk won the gold medal in interior design, and Kiera Campbell won bronze in fashion design.

that brought national recognition to EVIT.

New law makes EVIT elective of choice for charter schools

Arizona's charter schools and Mesa's East Valley Institute of Technology have a lot in common. Both are schools of choice, rather than drawing an automatic enrollment. Both offer niche programs to suit individual interests. Both serve college-bound students as well as students who want a career after high school.

And now – thanks to a new law that increases charter school funding – both are better able to offer high quality career and technical education to charter students.

When Gov. Jan Brewer signed SB 1447 into law, she effectively raised the state funding for charter students who attend joint technological education districts like EVIT to be equal to that of district students.

Charter students have always been able to enroll at EVIT, but in the past, the sending charter school and EVIT lost money because the charters were funded at a lower rate. SB 1447 ended that inequity.

"Previously, charter students were treated as worth less than district students," said Eileen B. Sigmund, president of the Arizona Charter Schools Association. "Thanks to the hard work of the bill's sponsor, Sen. Kimberly Yee, a charter student attending a JTED is now treated equally."

Charter school students who reside in Mesa, Scottsdale, Gilbert, Chandler, Tempe, Higley, Fountain Hills, Apache Junction, Queen Creek and J.O. Combs districts are eligible to attend EVIT's centralized Mesa campuses – the Dr. A. Keith Crandell (Main) Campus at 1601 W. Main St., and the East Campus at 6625 S. Power Road.

They have about 40 occupational programs to choose from, and most EVIT programs offer college credit, as well as professional certifications.

Animation, game design students beta test game project

On, Aug. 23, former EVIT Animation student Matt Weldon, currently a senior attending the Art Institute of Phoenix, returned to Mr. Johnston's class with a team of AI students to have the current Animation and Game Design students beta test a game project they are working on. Part of the AI's curriculum involves having advanced students to actually design, produce and make available for play, a game of their choice. Matt and his team have worked for the past 10 weeks producing this game level, which is still in its infancy.

This event worked on many levels. First, Matt and his team had a group of potential customers test out the game, looking for bugs

and errors, free of charge. Secondly, all students were asked to fill out a questionnaire about their gaming experience, and what suggestions, if any, they would make to the development team, which exercised their creative thinking skills, critiquing the game play based on their own likes, dislikes and experiences. Third, it gets the current students excited about going to college and working on projects like this, as well as seeing what graduates of this current program are able to accomplish.

Matt and his team received over 200 critical suggestions and recommendations, some of which were already in the works by the rest of the development team.

Health programs like medical assistant prepare students for licensing exams and jobs after high school – jobs that can also help pay for college while they work in their field of interest. The automotive program can lead to industry certification and jobs at dealerships with high starting pay.

Programs like welding and precision machining feed into industries with high demand. All 33 students who completed welding in May have been hired.

One of EVIT's most popular programs – cosmetology – can save families thousands of dollars because it's tuition-free to high school students. The same training costs more than \$20,000 at private cosmetology schools.

"EVIT is about all kids having an opportunity to receive the best career and technical education, so we are embracing the opportunity to serve more charter students," said Superintendent Sally Downey.

Students like 17-year-old Kelcie Seely, a Gilbert student enrolled in Primavera online charter school. Seely will be starting her second year in EVIT's Design, Merchandising and Textiles program.

"I can forget about the entire world and just focus on something I love doing. And, it's like I have a family there," she said.
