

Future Engineers is based on the rigorous and innovative Infinity curriculum from Southern Methodist University. The students in Future Engineers have the opportunity to do hands-on experiments and activities at ASU Polytechnic. EVIT thanks ASU President Michael Crow and Intel for their support!

EVIT is continuing to work on three major goals to maintain the high quality of our programs: Having college credit available in every program, working with districts and charter schools to have more of our programs serve as embedded high school credits, and making sure that every EVIT program leads to a third-party certification or license so our students leave with a portable credential. Those are the true measures of success for any CTE program.



neil barna: 'evit is the best kept secret in arizona'



EVIT has no greater fan than Neil Barna, senior vice president of Meridian Bank. For about 13 years, he has served on the EVIT Education Foundation Board, lending his time and expertise to a program that provides scholarships to help pay students' fees.

"Gosh, I believe that my first year was 2001. I've had so much fun that I cannot recall when I joined the board," Barna said. "The reason I continue to serve is because of one Dr. Sally Downey. Her passion for EVIT is contagious."

Barna points to Superintendent Downey's leadership and the EVIT students as the school's greatest strengths.

"In the time that I have been on the foundation board, her ability to create partnerships with business and industry has set EVIT apart," he said. "Students come to EVIT on a mission. And when you combine a motivated student with a motivated leader, all of a sudden the opportunities seem without bounds."

An accountant by education and banker by trade, Barna served as president of a number of banks in Iowa and Arizona between 1979 and 2009. He was founding president and CEO of Mesa Bank in 1998 before selling the bank to Capitol Bancorp in 2002. As senior vice president at Meridian Bank, he currently operates out of Meridian's Gilbert office.

Meridian Bank sponsors a table at the annual EVIT Foundation fund-raising breakfast.

"EVIT is the best kept secret in Arizona ... I am always amazed at how many folks in attendance (at the breakfast) come up to me and tell me that they didn't realize the depth and breadth of the success stories that start with an EVIT education," Barna said. "I am truly an EVIT fan!"

bistro 13

**opens, expands experience
for culinary students**

Culinary Arts students at the East Valley Institute of Technology are getting practical, first-hand experience in operating their own restaurant – the new Bistro 13.

Located next-door to EVIT's Dr. A. Keith Crandell (Main) Campus at 1353 W. Main Street in Mesa, Bistro 13 features global cuisine such as a Thai Grilled Mahi Mahi Sandwich and Southwest Chipotle Ranch Salad, a variety of soups, desserts and breads baked by EVIT's commercial baking program, and iced coffee and assorted drinks.

Chef Joe Kalfus is the instructor in charge of Bistro 13. He said the restaurant will expand educational and professional opportunities for EVIT's culinary students, which already include hands-on experience in the campus banquet hall and internships. He also stressed that Bistro 13 is a classroom first and a business second.

"It's a classroom that happens to have customers coming in," he said. "Our vision is that we want Bistro 13 to be an enhancement of what we're already doing so that our students will get restaurant, as well as banquet and catering, experience."

The restaurant serves a lunch menu from 10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., Tuesday through Friday. Kalfus said the schedule may change for the spring semester. By next summer, he would like to see Bistro 13 open five days a week for breakfast and lunch.

"We want to be able to adapt and evolve," he said.

While the cuisine is "global," there are some more traditional items too – but with an EVIT twist. The "Bistro 13 Burger" is two quarter-pound patties of choice meat ground in-house, grilled, finished with herb butter and garnished with house pickled cucumber, lettuce, tomato and onion. "Dr. D's Mac and Cheese" features pasta and house-smoked chicken in a roasted pepper cheese sauce.

"The menu items fit well in the marketplace and are educational too," Kalfus said. "These menu items are there for a reason: They're putting what's being taught in Culinary into a context."

EVIT classes are normally 8 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. and noon to 2:30 p.m. An additional block – 10:45 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. has been added for some Culinary students who are working in Bistro 13, Kalfus said. Additional Culinary students will also rotate through Bistro 13 so they can get restaurant experience too.



“There’s a place for everybody” in the culinary industry, Kalfus said. “I’m excited about Bistro 13 giving our students more options and serving the community.”

Superintendent Sally Downey said Bistro 13 promotes culinary education while contributing to the Mesa community.

After purchasing the old Fazoli’s building, which had sat vacant for years in west Mesa, EVIT cleaned up the property and remodeled it. In fact, students in five EVIT programs – Culinary, Interior Design, Welding, HVAC and Construction – worked on the renovation. The interior features bright colors in gold, teal and red. Each table design centers on a different country to help carry through the “global cuisine” theme.



As part of its contribution to the Mesa community, Bistro 13 will always offer free coffee and other drinks to anyone who works in public safety, such as the police or fire department, Downey said.

Bistro 13 is part of EVIT’s top-ranked culinary arts program. EVIT students posted the highest scores of all East Valley culinary arts programs on the most recent state assessment. And, EVIT’s Culinary Arts and Commercial Baking and Pastry Arts programs are the only high school culinary and baking programs in Arizona accredited by the American Culinary Federation Education Foundation.

Multimedia restructures into program with 3 majors

Austin Young, an honors student at Desert Ridge High School in Gilbert Public Schools, plans to attend Northern Arizona University or Arizona State University and become a graphic designer. But he's already getting a jump on developing design skills and a professional work ethic through the Multimedia Technologies program at the East Valley Institute of Technology.

"I came to EVIT to get a more advanced education," said Young, 17. "At EVIT, we get to work with the latest technology and we get more time to work on graphic design."

Like other students at EVIT, a career and technical school offering over 30 occupational training programs, Young spends a half day at his high school and a half day at EVIT. Multimedia Technologies is a two-year program with first-year students taking Introduction to Multimedia Technologies. Then in their second year, they choose a specialty course – Graphic Design, Photography or Web Design.



One of the program's strengths is that it exposes students to professional work as they contract with businesses to develop advertising and marketing materials and campaigns.

"We have students who want to be photographers, graphic designers or web designers," said instructor Eric Perez. "They focus on those areas to build not only entry level skills, but also entrepreneurship skills."

The multimedia program is based on a skill achievement system using lanyards in different colors, similar to the belt ranking system in martial arts.

First-year students earn their white lanyard based on knowledge, a yellow lanyard for helping other students and meeting deadlines, an orange lanyard when they're ready to assist a multimedia marketing team as a support professional, and finally, a blue lanyard when they're ready to be a team member, take direction, mentor others, and demonstrate leadership. Second-year students earn a green lanyard to indicate they take direction well and are ready to run a team, and a red lanyard when they're ready to run teams and work with a client from conceptualization of an idea to delegating artwork to first-year students. Second-year students earn the highest level – a black lanyard – when they are ready for internships and employment.

Through it all, they work with real life clients, such as Barbara Greenberg, executive director of Kids Who Care, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit group that assists schools in developing service-learning projects for students. Greenberg said she has been very impressed with the poster and T-shirt designs and public service announcements the multimedia students have created for her organization.

"They are so sophisticated and poised and professional," Greenberg said. "They are beyond their age in terms of what they know about computers, graphics and marketing."

Multimedia Technologies has a 98 percent success rate in placing students in jobs, college or the military.

New program at East prepares students for engineering college major

The East Valley Institute of Technology has partnered with Intel, Southern Methodist University and Arizona State University Polytechnic to offer a unique course to prepare high school students for success in a four-year college engineering program.

EVIT's Future Engineers program is based on a rigorous, high-tech curriculum developed by SMU in Texas and is offered at EVIT's East Campus, 6625 S. Power Road in Mesa.

It's an example of how career and technical education has evolved beyond industrial trades to include college prep, and why EVIT has been called "the new model for career and technical education," said Superintendent Sally Downey.

Future Engineers and its SMU Infinity Project curriculum challenges students in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) as a step toward college and an engineering career.

"This stellar program is all about STEM," Downey said. "We take pride in being the first Arizona school to offer this engineering program."

EVIT's program was developed in part by retired Intel engineer Kevin Kurtz through the Experience Matters Encore Fellows program. Intel partners with Experience Matters to place retiring engineers in organizations in the community where they can share their passion and expertise.

Up to 50 percent of the course time is dedicated to hands-on engineering projects and experiments, to eventually include class work in labs at ASU Polytechnic, located adjacent to the East Campus. Assistant Principal Craig Pearson said EVIT is working on endorsements that will make college credit available too.


Downey said the program's goal is to encourage more students to become engineering majors at ASU or a university of their choice, and then hopefully go on to become engineers at Intel.

"It's designed to help Intel home-grow its workforce," she said.

Kurtz said the one-year program stresses all areas of engineering and especially appeals to students who enjoy figuring out how things work and how to put things together. The students explore thermodynamics, robotics, electricity, chemistry, solar power, biomechanics, environmental engineering and much more.

According to the Infinity Project website, the "Engineering Design" portion of the curriculum includes four modules – electrical, mechanical, biomedical and environmental engineering – and teaches students to build a robotic rover, prosthetic implant and more. In the "Math for Innovators" part of the curriculum, students learn how to apply math to engineering problems such as those involving physics of machines and electricity, to name a few.

Students in Future Engineers may also get the opportunity assist with The Great Globe project, which has been housed at EVIT's Main Campus, where scientist Bryan Beaulieu is leading a team of engineers and children from across the United States in building a 42-story replica of the Earth as an educational tourist attraction.

Did you know that EVIT's Culinary Arts program and Commercial Baking and Pastry Arts program are the only high school culinary/baking programs in Arizona accredited by the American Culinary Federation Education Foundation. This ensures that EVIT's programs meet national standards and provides the opportunity for EVIT culinary/baking students to test for national certification as a Certified Junior Culinarian or Secondary Culinary Graduate. There are high school culinary programs all over the East Valley, but none except EVIT's programs provide this level of high quality, accredited training.

Automotive instructor Randy Baker has been recognized as one of the top automotive instructors in the nation by ASE Industry Education Alliance.
